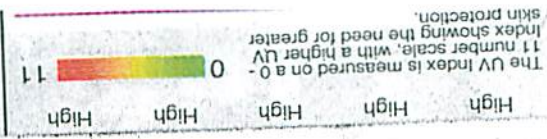

Artist donates nearly \$33,000 of equipment for RAM

Donation from Pikeville office allows Baker to make gift of office furnishings

Dr. Barker, D.M.D. finally finished commuting back and forth from Lexington to Pikeville. After operating dental offices in both cities for 21 years, he decided to close his Pikeville

office. "I had a hard decision, but I just didn't want to do it anymore," he said. Dr. Barker decided to donate the equipment from the Pikeville office — including dental chairs, diagnostic monitors, x-ray machines and other equipment — to the Forward Pike County Medical (RAM) Foundation, a non-

profit organization that supports Pike County RAM Expeditions. His generosity will benefit the hundreds of Pike County citizens who will solicit medical services from RAM next summer and in the summers to come," said Pike County Judge-Executive Wayne T. Rutherford.

Dr. William Collins, whom Dr. Barker mentioned, was the dental coordinator for the 2008 Pike County RAM Expedition, and has signed on again to be the dental coordinator for 2009's expedition. Dr. Collins' hard work for the 2008 RAM Expedition made it possible for 476 people to receive free dental services during the two-day event.

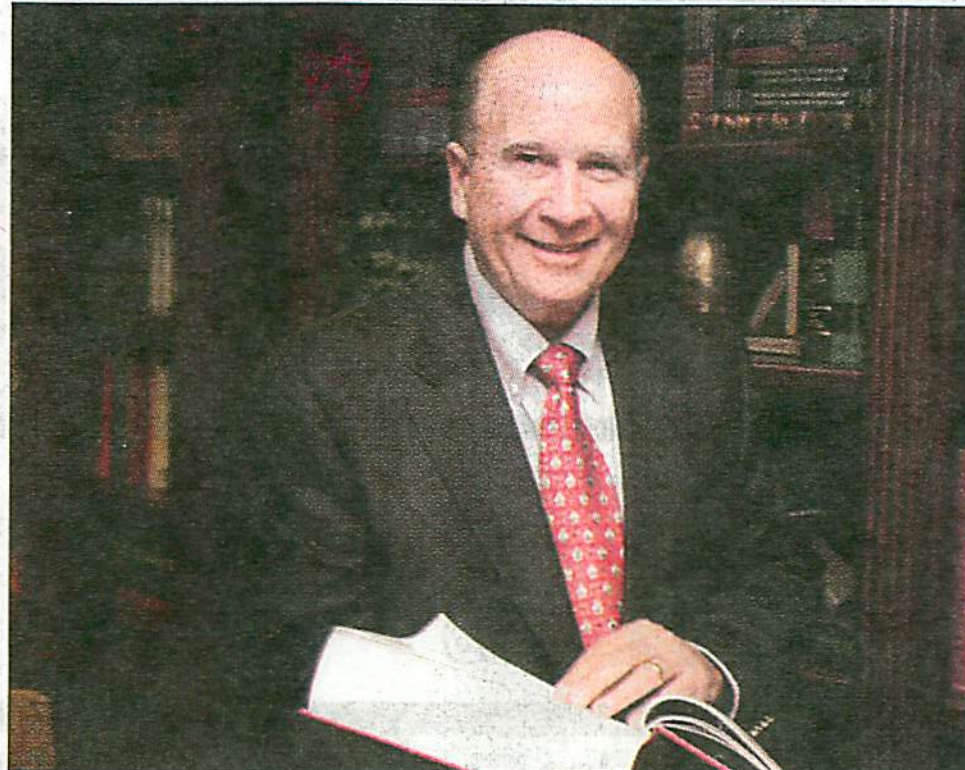


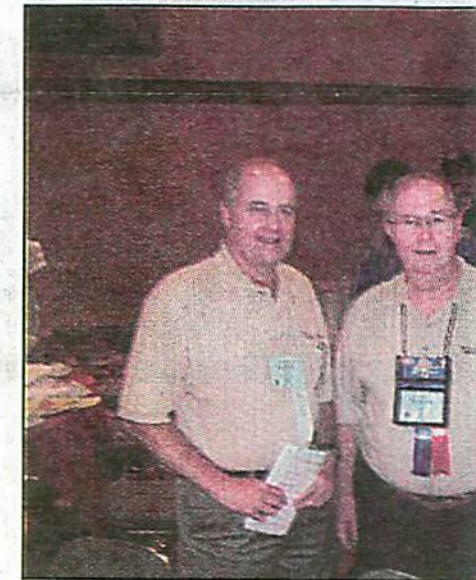
